There is a time for everything... Rev Chris Harris

I was recently invited to meet Bishop Jackie for my end-of-curacy interview, during which I would find out whether I am deemed ready to be 'signed off' – that is, my on-the-job training has been successful and I am ready to be let loose on the public at large in my

own right! Jackie was happy to tell me that she was prepared to sign me off So I have now crossed a threshold; the sands of time are trickling through the neck of an hourglass and by the time they run out, Hannah and I will need to have found a permanent post.

We all face threshold moments in life, and they are not always of our choosing or at the times that we would prefer them to be. Even those that we instigate can be bittersweet, as stepping into something new almost always involves letting go of something else, and that thing might be precious to us. How, then, can we navigate change?

I think we need grace. Change is hard, especially so when it is compounded by grief, uncertainty, or longing. We can easily become bitter and hardened when letting go of something that has had its season. I think we need humility. It is tempting to feel that we are essential where we are, that things would fall apart without us, and so we stay on, but in so doing, we don't discover what God has in store for us when we lay something down at the end of its time. Space that we leave gives space for others to grow into, and our hands that are now empty, though they may feel bereft, are clear to receive something new. I think we need patience. What's next isn't always clear straight away, and once we've let go we can grasp for the comfort of something new to hold on to. Sometimes ground needs be left fallow for a while. Sometimes there are things to learn in a sabbatical – the times of sabbath.

I think we need to set our eyes on heaven. Our lives are like grass, like the flowers of the field, yet they have meaning and purpose. What God wants to do in and through us now is exciting, but it is also a signpost towards a coming reality of the Kingdom of Heaven renewing all creation. As we navigate change, I think most of all we need to see how our stories are swept up in that great story at the centre of creation.



And we're off!

These coming few weeks are crucial for the future of St Mary's, Totnes. Now is the time to pull together, dig deep and help secure the future of this much-loved place. We need your help.

St Mary's is a green oasis in the heart of Totnes. It is a place of deep spiritual significance. It has been a site of worship for hundreds of years. And St Mary's is so much more! In June a decision will be made about a major grant from the Heritage Fund. This would enable St Mary's to improve it's facilites through sustainable heating, increased accessibility, a toilet, and comfortable seating. Success would also mean a full programme of community events and building deeper links with many people in the town and beyond.

St Mary's needs to show that all this is viable and that it matters. To do this, we need to raise funds locally, and as quickly as possible. The more money we can raise, or show we can raise, the greater our chances of a successful outcome. Every £100 we raise could generate £900 of grant funding. That's really significant! Our target is to raise £100,000. We have made a great start, and now need to secure £75,000.

Doubting Thomas sees a kingfisher



I wanted to give him a gift, so as he sat on the river's bank that day – his mind edging out from himself to rest, gentle as a butterfly on the lip of the world, lighting on the poplars silver against the sky's blue, the young nettles cunningly threaded into the turf around him, thinking that he'd like to see a kingfisher, wondering which river god to ask to give him one -I caught his attention with a splash downstream, then opened my hands and let her go. She flew, bullet-shaped, long and low in front of him, left to right as he sat, as though he were reading the kingfisher's flight, as though she were a message to him, which she was - spooling her way upstream for three seconds which in human terms is the length of the present moment.

Afterwards he tried to justify it to himself: he figured he'd already registered it from the corner of his eye, had seen it into thought and not the other way around.

But in that September moment I gave him the gift of now in the shape of a kingfisher, and he saw and believed.

Love Your Burial Ground Week 8 – 16 June

St John's Bridgetown are having a talk by Dr Richard Fox, a moth and butterfly expert, on Friday June 14 at 7pm and setting up a moth trap after dark in the churchyard, if weather permits. All are welcome and it will be free.

There will also be a photo exhibition of photos taken in the churchyard by KEVICC's students last summer, and a poetry trail around the churchyard by St John's Primary school.


On Saturday June 15 there is a "Welcome to the Churchyard" day in Bridgetown churchyard 10am till 4pm. Drop in any time. At 10am Dr Fox will reveal whatever was found in the moth trap and there will be free spotter sheets for butterflies, flowers, trees, lichens and mini beasts, and a trail to find ten interesting graves. The day will be suitable for all ages. We would like to record people's findings that day, and to encourage visitors to perhaps get involved in an ongoing project of adopting kerbed edge graves and planting wildflower seeds in them to encourage insect life and biodiversity. Please come!



St Mary's are also planning an event in the Churchyard during Love your Burial Ground Week. A project is underway to involve some local schools in surveying the wildlife and the use of the Churchyard, with a view to producing a report to make suggestions about how to improve biodiversity. The Independent School have started their visits, and the Grove are also keen to be involved. KEVICCs may also become involved. In Love your Burial Ground week we plan to hold a

'thank you' picnic for the young people who have been involved and parents/staff. Our curate Frances is coordinating a date for this, but in the meantime, if you are out and about and spot the schools in the churchyard, please do take time to say hello and thank them for their work on our behalf. The staff we have engaged with from the schools are very positive indeed about supporting this project and are keen to be involved in enhancing an important green space in the town centre.

St Dogmael's Abbey Cardiganshire, St Mary's Rattery and Dartington

In the 12th Century the owner of Dartington Hall, then a wooden castle was Sir Robert Fitzpaine from Normandy. He funded the rebuilding of St Dogmael's Abbey by the

River Teifi in stone as he wished to 'Normanise' the Celtic people of Wales.

Between 1199 and the Reformation in 1536 Benedictine Brothers traveled by sea to Bideford then rode down what was to become the Mariner's way to serve as priests in St Mary's Rattery and at St Mary's Dartington Hall.

These days, St Dogmael's Abbey is ruined and cared for by CADW with a Visitors Centre run by with an excellent museum and cafe with a Tuesday market with folk singers. The Mill 'Y Felin' has been lovingly restored with the ancient wooden mill workings and is open for tours some days. Everyone I met in the village was very friendly and hospitable. The White Hart is a community inn with games for children and a helpful local historian.

St Dogmael's Abbey was destroyed in the iconoclasm but is part of our local heritage. In 1455, Fr John Thomas Hylle OSB made this journey to become priest in St Mary's Rattery, welcomed by our villagers. Some Saturdays he rode down the bridle paths to meet the



Benedictine Brothers at St Mary's Priory Church Totnes for midday repast. Young Anna Hannaford lived by Penswell and was lady's maid to Elisabeth Gybbes at Venton Manor. Her brother John was one of the serving lads at Mass. The two young ladies were devout and leant the psalms in Latin with his help. When Elisabeth was 18 in spring 1468 she walked up through the bluebell woods with Anna to pray in the lady chapel. She heard the Madonna say 'Elisabeth your time is now ready, after Pentecost you and Anna will join your cousins to became a Bridgettine nun at Syon Abbey Isleworth'. She became fifth Great Abbess of Syon Abbey in 1487. Anna was a lay Sister and loved her work in the monastery garden. After Abbess Elisabeth died in 1518, she returned to end her days in her beloved village of Rattery.
